Staffing Update: -

- Superintendent's Personnel Report Mrs. Reed reviewed the Superintendent's report
- Review of Open Positions Mrs. Reed reviewed the district's current vacancies

Interventionist on Special Assignment- Mrs. Ringle presented a new district initiative, funded through a grant, designed to address student learning loss. In its first year, the grant would provide approximately \$187,000 to the district. She explained the purpose of the newly created Interventionist position and confirmed that funding is secured for two years. Beyond that timeframe, continued support would depend on the district's acceptance into the program for additional funding cycles.

Mrs. Ringle further noted that, should funding not be available after the initial two-year period, the district would follow the provisions outlined in the FEA collective bargaining agreement to reassign the employee to a classroom teaching position.

<u>Flu Clinic-</u> Mrs. Reed reviewed the results of the employee flu clinic interest survey, reporting that 53.1% of respondents indicated they were not interested in receiving the flu shot, while 46.9% expressed interest. Based on the survey data, approximately 72 vaccinations will be needed.

The committee agreed to move forward with offering the flu clinic but determined it would be held on a single day due to the limited level of interest. Mrs. Reed will coordinate the scheduling of the clinic and distribute notification to staff.

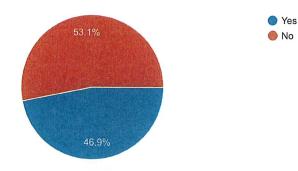

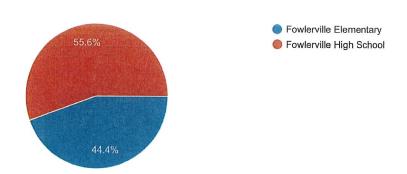

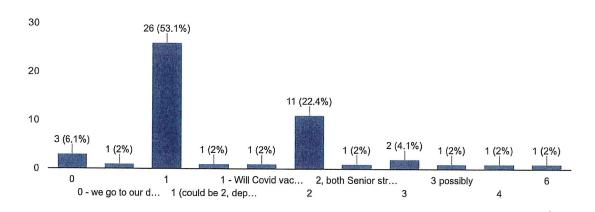

Call to the Public - None

<u>State Budget Update -</u> The finance team has examined cash flow to ensure payroll obligations for October can be met even if the expected state aid payment is delayed. Conversations have also taken place with the district's banking partner to arrange borrowing if necessary. Parents and staff have been notified.

Meal Program – The committee discussed continuing the district's free meal program through the end of October. Future funding remains uncertain, and the food service department is working to increase application submissions to maintain participation. Participation rates are expected to decline if free meals end, and pricing information from the previous year was reviewed.

<u>Audit</u> – Due to delays at the federal level, the compliance supplement has not yet been released, preventing auditors from issuing a final report in October. A draft audit will be reviewed by the Finance Committee in the meantime.

Additionally, it was reported that the Little Glad's program has been operating at a loss following previous rate adjustments, drawing down its fund balance. The administration plans to address this issue and stabilize the program's finances as the program grows and over time.

2021 Bond Reconciliation Update - The finance team presented an update on the status of bond funds and interest earnings. A preliminary arbitrage amount of approximately \$1.775 million is expected to be rebated, leaving between \$1.2 and \$1.8 million in interest earnings. The committee reviewed allowable uses of these funds based on the original 2021 bond language.

The new facilities and grounds assessment is nearing completion. Once finalized, it will help guide priorities for allocating the remaining bond funds. The committee also discussed the timing of a future bond. Delaying a new bond until 2028 or 2029 could allow the district to exit the School Bond Loan Fund, reducing long-term costs to taxpayers. Repayment strategies were reviewed as part of this discussion.

<u>Other</u> – The committee discussed the proposed data center project. Members discussed potential environmental and community impacts, including water usage, power infrastructure demands, noise concerns, and emissions from diesel generators. Particular concern was raised about the potential for continuous noise to affect nearby school buildings. No action was taken on this matter.

Appendix A

5136 - PERSONAL COMMUNICATION DEVICES

For purposes of this policy, "personal communication device" refers to student owned electronic devices . Examples includes: computers, tablets (e.g., iPads and similar devices), electronic readers ("e-readers"; e.g., Kindles and similar devices), cell phones (e.g., mobile/cellular telephones), smartphones (e.g., BlackBerry, iPhone, Android devices, Windows Mobile devices, etc.) smartwatches, Airpods/earbuds/headphones, wearable technology, and/or other web-enabled devices of any type.

For Students in Grades K-5

In order to avoid disruption of the educational environment and protect students' right of privacy, student use of PCDs is prohibited on school grounds during school hours. Students shall keep their PCD turned off and in a locker or backpack during school hours.

For Students in Grades 6-12

Students may use personal communication devices (PCDs) before and after school, during their lunch break, in between classes, during after school activities (e.g., extra-curricular activities), or at school-related functions as long as they do not create a distraction, disruption or otherwise interfere with the educational environment. Use of PCDs, except those approved by a teacher or administrator, at any other time, is prohibited and they must be powered completely off (i.e., not just placed into vibrate or silent mode) and stored out of sight.

Possession of a PCD by a student at school during school hours and/or during extra-curricular activities is a privilege that may be forfeited by any student who fails to abide by the terms of this policy, or otherwise abuses this privilege.

For All Students Grades K-12

Students shall not use PCDs while riding to and from school on a school bus or other Board-provided vehicles, or on a school bus or Board-provided vehicles during school-sponsored activities.

Using a PCD to capture, record and/or transmit audio and/or pictures/video of an individual without proper consent is considered an invasion of privacy and is not permitted. Students who violate this provision and/or use a PCD to violate the privacy rights of another person may have their PCD confiscated and held until the end of the school day or a parent/guardian picks it up, and may be directed to delete the audio and/or picture/video file while the parent/guardian is present. If the violation involves potentially illegal activity, the confiscated-PCD may be turned-over to law enforcement.

The use of cameras (i.e., devices that take still or motion pictures, whether in a digital or other format) is prohibited in locker rooms, shower facilities, and/or rest/bathrooms.

Students shall have no expectation of confidentiality with respect to their use of PCDs on school premises/property.

Students may not use a PCD in any way that might reasonably create in the mind of another person an impression of being threatened, humiliated, harassed, embarrassed or intimidated. See Policy 5517.01 – Bullying and Other Forms of Aggressive Behavior. In particular, students are prohibited from using PCDs to: (1) transmit material that is threatening, obscene, disruptive, or sexually explicit or that can be construed as harassment or disparagement of others based upon their race, color, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, disability, age, religion, ancestry, or political beliefs; and (2) engage in "sexting" - i.e., sending, receiving, sharing, viewing, or possessing pictures, text messages, e-mails or other materials of a sexual nature in electronic or any other form. Violation of these prohibitions shall result in disciplinary action. Furthermore, such actions will be reported to local law enforcement and child services as required by law.

Students are also prohibited from using a PCD to capture, record, and/or transmit test information or any other information in a manner constituting fraud, theft, cheating, or academic dishonesty. Likewise, students are prohibited from using PCDs to receive such information.

Violations of this policy may result in disciplinary action and/or confiscation of the PCD. The building principal will also refer the matter to law enforcement or child services if the violation involves an illegal

activity (e.g., child pornography, sexting). Discipline will be imposed on an escalating scale ranging from a warning to an expulsion based on the number of previous violations and/or the nature of or circumstances surrounding a particular violation. If the PCD is confiscated, it will be released/returned to the student's parent/guardian after the student complies with any other disciplinary consequences that are imposed, unless the violation involves potentially illegal activity in which case the PCD may be turned-over to law enforcement. A confiscated device will be marked in a removable manner with the student's name and held in a secure location in the building's central office until it is retrieved by the parent/guardian or turned-over to law enforcement. School officials will not search or otherwise tamper with PCDs in District custody unless they reasonably suspect that the search is required to discover evidence of a violation of the law or other school rules. Any search will be conducted in accordance with Policy 5771 – Search and Seizure. If multiple offenses occur, a student may lose his/her privilege to bring a PCD to school for a designated length of time or on a permanent basis.

A person who discovers a student using a PCD in violation of this policy is required to report the violation to the building principal.

Students are personally and solely responsible for the care and security of their PCDs. The Board assumes no responsibility for theft, loss, or damage to, or misuse or unauthorized use of, PCDs brought onto its property.

Parents/Guardians are advised that the best way to get in touch with their child during the school day is by calling the school office.

Students shall use school phones to contact parents/guardians during the school day.

<u>ALICE School Safety Program – Board Committee Overview</u>

1. Overview of **ALICE**

- Acronym: Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate
- Core Philosophy: ALICE is a proactive, options-based response to an armed intruder or violent event, empowering staff and students to make informed decisions to stay safe.
- Difference from Traditional Lockdowns:
 - o *Traditional*: "Lockdown and hide" only.
 - ALICE: Multiple, flexible response options—evacuation, barricading, communication, distraction—based on real-time information.

2. Rationale for Consideration

- FCS hasn't updated its Active Shooter training in several years, and we would like to strengthen our overall training and approach
- In conversations with Fowlerville Police and Livingston County Sheriff we learned that they would recommend this approach

3. Example of Districts in MI Who Adopted ALICE:

- Livingston County: Howell
- Ann Arbor Public Schools District, Birmingham Public Schools, Novi Community School District, Van Buren Public Schools, Grand Blanc Community Schools, Mason Public Schools, Kalamazoo Public Schools, Farmington Public Schools, Chelsea School District, Dexter Community Schools, Flat Rock Community Schools, Laker School District, etc.
- <u>Livingston County Sheriff</u> uses a method that incorporates elements of ALICE training
- Fowlerville Police Department: Officer Ryan Edmonds is going to training to become an ALICE certified trainer



4. Training Requirements

• **Who**: All district staff, Administrators – *advanced training*, Students – *age-appropriate lessons and drills*.

Frequency & Format:

- Annual refresher training provided online and in-person (approx. 1 hour each time)
- Online modules for foundational knowledge
 - Provided by Navigate 360
 - Once staff takes the course, we will get an organizational ALICE certification
 - ALICE modules for the various groups, like bus drivers, administrators, etc.
 - Provides us with templates for communicating this with families, lesson plans for K-12 classrooms tailored to each age group
- In-person drills & simulations led by Officer Edmonds (Active Shooter Drills), tailored to the grade-level

Age-Appropriate Adjustments:

- K–2: Focus on "safe choices" language, simplified scenarios, without any graphic details such as potentially not practice Counter explicitly
- 3–5: Introduce movement and barricade concepts
- 6–12: Full ALICE protocol with discussion and practice

5. Implementation Plan

Potential Timeline:

- o August 25 September 25:
 - Adoption by the full School Board of Education.
 - Notification sent to families and staff by Superintendent and Building Principals.
 - Assistant Superintendent and Tech Department to work with Navigate 360 to ensure online training is available and ready for professional development



October 25 - November 25 :

- All staff complete online modules during staff meetings or district provided PD.
- ALICE is incorporated into the District Emergency Operations Plan and school crisis response procedures as led by the Director of Safety, with support from Building Principals and SRO.
- December 25 June 26:
 - Begin student lessons and ALICE drills led by Officer Edmonds.
 - Director of Safety and SRO, with support from Building Principals works in partnership with Fowlerville police, sheriff's office, and fire/EMS for drills and response alignment.

6. Costs & Resources

Senior Exam Policy

Exam Policy (Senior)

Each course has a semester exam and applies to all level courses. Semester exams may take the form of culminating projects, oral examinations, formative assessments etc. at the discretion of the teacher.

Seniors are excused from an exam in a course if they have a semester grade of 84% or higher in that course.

All course exams are to be administered during the last week of class unless extenuating circumstances force the exam(s) to be taken earlier.

Legitimate Stakeholder Questions:

- When do I have to have the 84%?
- So a semester grade does not include the final?
- Does each course just for seniors have a semester exam for all level courses?
- Are course exams just for seniors administered during the last week of class?
- Are we referring to the last week of the course or the **seniors' last week**?

- All students are required to take all final exams beginning with the current (25-26) school year.

Short Term - Option B

Amend and Sunset It

- Keep it as it is in handbook, as used in 2024-2025, except:
- Seniors are only excused from semester two final exams, not semester one final exams.
- Communicate to all stakeholders that the Senior Exam Policy will be eliminated for the 26-27 school year as part of a larger revision of district exam policies.
